principals spend time in classrooms observing teaching and learning.

By looking at the interaction of teachers, students and content in classrooms, one can learn about practices that should be replicated and practices that should be abandoned. Additionally, while teacher is busy teaching, the principal is better able to notice how students react to different parts of the lesson, whether or not they appear challenged, how the classroom environment contributes (or deters) from their work.

The principal's challenge is to compose feedback that acknowledges the good work teachers do (and being specific so that they will continue to do these very good things!) while also giving something to improve upon where necessary.

Budget Development

While the hopes of an economic recovery are more of

a reality than at this time last year, we have begun the development of the 2011-12 budget with continued care. The Chief Financial Officer and I will review building requests and staffing needs from principals and will submit a recommended budget to Regional School Board. Some of the considerations are: staffing, retirement, student enrollment, resource requests, and budget projections.

Best wishes to all for the holidays. Enjoy some good books during the break.



sociation for School Business Officials International (ASBO International).

The SFO Certification, a new certification by ASBO International, is granted to highly qualified individuals who fulfill multiple requirements, including demonstrating eligibility (through work experience and education), passing a comprehensive two-part exam that tests competency in accounting and school business management topics, and adhering to the ASBO International Certification Code of Conduct.

By earning the SFO certification, pro-

fessionals validate their specialized knowledge and demonstrate a commitment to high standards and ethical practice in school business management.

Ryan Tilbury Appointed to Alaska Veterans' Advisory Council



Governor Parnell appointed Ryan Tilbury, and reappointed Mayfield Evans, Joseph Fields, Ron Huffman and John Guinn to the Alaska Veterans' Advisory Council. The council advises the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs on matters concerning state veterans, their dependents and their survivors. Tilbury, of Fairbanks, is a transportation operations officer in the U.S. Air Force Reserve. He is currently assigned to J-4 Transportation as Deputy Chief,

Air Branch, Yongson Army Garrison, U.S. Forces Korea. In 2008, he deployed to Manas AB, Republic of Kyrgyzstan as the deployment and distribution flight commander. Since 2004, he has worked as a school counselor in the Yukon-Koyukuk School District. Tilbury is also actively involved with the University of Alaska Fairbanks



Yukon Koyukuk Rifle Program

Toward the end of last year, Superintendent Boyd shared a goal for having a Rifle program in YKSD. She wanted something culturally relevant and something our students could take with them after the formal school is completed and stay with the students forever.

Work began immediately to obtain the certificates and tools needed to accomplish a successful Rifle program. With the assistance of the NRA, the proper training was provided for an instructor, thus in turn providing instruction for coaches at each site. The Civilian Marksmanship Program was able to offer air rifles of .177 caliber for a fraction of the cost of new ones. Twenty rifles were ordered, targets, pellets and kits for coaches.

Coaches were required to attend 8 hours of training, scoring a 90% on an exam prior to receiving their certification to coach this sport. The rewards are extensive, with successful shooters in Alaska receiving full ride scholarships at UAF, and many in the lower 48. The Olympic sport of biathlon is one this program could potentially expand into in future years, which includes cross country skiing with a rifle on your back, and shooting at targets combined.

Students learned Gun Safety and the three Main rules (#1 Always keep the gun pointed in a safe direction, #2 Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot and #3 Always keep the gun unloaded until ready to use), proper handling of firearms, proper breathing techniques, best methods for accurate shot placement and many more skills which they will never forget.

Scoring in Air Rifle is determined by the placing on the target, with the highest point value of 10 requiring the placement of a shot in the area ½ the size of an average adults little finger nail. Competitions and scoring is based on shooting 20 shots in each position of Prone (lying down on your belly) Kneeling, and Standing. That is a total of 60 shots, one shot at a time from a fairly heavy rifle for some of our smaller students. By the end of the competition, student's arms became hard to keep stable for shooting. Of course anyone can shoot a rifle, but to shoot it accurately every single time takes a lot of skill and patience.

Programs were offered to all sites, with Allakaket, Johnny Oldman, Jimmy Huntington, Gladys Dart, Merreline A. Kangas, Andrew K. Demoski, and Kaltag staff moving forward to receive training for this new program. We are very proud of all of these schools, with Johnny Oldman, Jimmy Huntington and Merreline A. Kangas competing in the finals at the District competition in December, having completed the entire season. Four in district competitions occurred, with differing winners surfacing from the sites almost every competition.
