

## State and Federal Programs Department

#### **Grant Highlights**

This is a busy time of year for the State and Federal Programs department. We are in the process of writing new grants, attending required grant meetings, and working to insure 1st quarter reporting requirements are met.

Our <u>Pre-K grant</u> is off to a great start. All Pre-K aides have been hired. Pre-K Open Court curriculum has been ordered and sent out to sites (although I believe we are still waiting on the order for one site). Site visits have been set up and Kim Barnes, education specialist, will be visiting each of the Pre-K sites to provide professional development through coaching and modeling. In addition, Pre-K supplies are currently being ordered for the classrooms.



The PE grant is getting off the ground. We have met with Challenge Life and are in the final stages of put-

ting a schedule together for site visits. These site visits will be a great time for students and community to get involved in physical fitness challenges afterschool. The Challenge Life team would also like to get into the classrooms during their visits to do a motivational talk

on healthy habits and life skills. The CL team will be meeting with principals to develop a schedule for visiting the classrooms during their visit. More information to come...



The Race to the Top grant is currently being developed. This grant is due in D.C. before October 30<sup>th</sup>. Through this project, we will be able to continue providing on-going professional development for teachers, focus more on using data to inform instructional practices, and insure our students are college or career ready upon graduation.

Life Skills Training – We are in the process of setting up a Life Skills training at the district office in Fairbanks. The training is scheduled for November  $26-27^{\rm th}$ . Our counselors, grad coaches and social worker will be participating in this training. The Life Skills curriculum has great activities that can easily be incorporated into the classroom. Some activities require only about 10 minutes of time, but offer a motivational message to students on prevention topics. The counseling staff will again be using this curriculum and activities when visiting classrooms.

# **AKSCI Science/Literacy Project**



Ten teachers from the YKSD and Yukon Flats SD are participating in the AKSCI Science / Literacy Project. YKSD was recently awarded a federal grant through the Title IIA Professional Development Partnership Grant and State of Alaska for the 2012-13 school year. Partners are YKSD, YFSD, the University of Alaska School of Education, and the University of Alaska Outreach department.

Teachers will learn inquiry-based science methods using topics from <a href="www.aksci.org">www.aksci.org</a>, the online science curriculum in its first year of implementation. The Science/Literacy Kits will include reading and writing activities that use the newly adopted State English/Language Arts standards, along with cultural standards to enhance student learning, PEAK strategies, and

instructional technology. Watch for these wonderful, teacher – developed learning kits to be posted to the YKSD web site at the end of this school year!

## Career & Technical Education



#### 1st Semester CTE Courses

In Allakaket, twelve (12) students are enrolled in Culinary Arts I. Business Computer Applications and Digital Photography are being taught in Nulato, with nine (9) students enrolled in each course. In Huslia, twelve (12) students are taking Animal Husbandry for Veterinary Science, seven (7) students are taking Woods I, twelve (12) students are in River Fisheries and fifteen (15) students are taking Environmental Survival. In Hughes, one (1) student is taking Animal Husbandry for Veterinary Science via distance. In Kaltag, four (4) students are taking Business Computer Applications. Two (2) students in Manley Hot Springs are taking Digital Photography. In Ruby, one (1) student is taking Fashion Design. In Minto, three (3) students are taking Keyboarding I. A total of 87 students are taking different CTE courses.

#### **English & Math Classes**

In partnership with UAF-IAC, a distance math and English class is being taught via distance. Students participate in videoconference classrooms; use Blackboard, Elluminate (E-Live) and email to interact with the university teacher. An on-site teacher monitors progress and coordinates with the UAF teacher. Students are provided instruction and given in-class time to complete homework. Students from Minto, Kaltag, Allakaket and Nulato are participating in this opportunity.



#### Math Skills Class (Algebra I/II)

Students are participating in a handson algebra class. The math class meets from 10:00-11:00 am daily, with the UAF teacher sending out weekly updates on assignments and lectures. Students will receive 1 high school credit and 6 college credits for completing the yearlong course. Currently,



# Business English Class (English 9/10/11/12)

Students are participating in a semester long English course focused on building their grammar skills through Business English. A second semester will be provided based on the students' abilities. Class meets daily from 2:00-3:00 pm, with the UAF teacher providing weekly updates on assignments and coursework. Students will receive 0.5 high school credits and 3 college credits for the semester.



#### Camp Kick Ash

Six (6) students, three (3) river students and three (3) Raven students are participating in Camp Kick Ash from Friday, October 5th to Thursday, October 25th. Students will receive basic firefighter apprenticeship training; have the opportunity to obtain their Emergency Trauma Technician certification (ETT-First Responder) and 3 UAF college credits/0.5 high school CTE or elective credits; learn high ropes, fire, water, ice, rescue techniques; outdoor survival skills; learn employability, teamwork, and leadership skills; learn to set individual and team goals; and develop independent living skills. Students are in Aniak, staying at the Joe Parent Vocational Center, from October 5th to October 20th. From October 20th to October 25th students will be in Fairbanks staying at the Fort Wainwright Barracks. In Fairbanks, the students will take what they have learn and integrate it into real life simulations with other Emergency Response professionals, connect with Rural Student Services at UAF, and learn about other college programs.

#### Future Educators of Alaska

YKSD is currently in its fourth year of partnering with Future Educators of Alaska (FEA) which is a grant funded program through the Department of Education, to help us "grow our own educators". The program is under a new funding cycle and received less funding which in turn means that YKSD will receive less funding as well. All of the money received from the program goes directly to fund our FEA Advisors at each of our sites and purchase FEA supplies in the amount of \$200. Job announcements went out in September and so far we have advisors in Minto (Monica Garza), Huslia (Casey Weter), Kaltag (Evelyn Esmailka), Koyukuk (Josie Dayton), and Allakaket (Camille Varin). Advisors will meet with students once a week throughout the school year for an hour to do activities. Weekly reports must be submitted online for grant reporting purposes. Club activities are range from anything to creating bulletin boards, grading papers, planning activities, elder visits, native singing and dancing, writing, book club, reading to elementary students, or even teaching a lesson. ## Native Language & Culture

The Native Language Program at YKSD is happy to announce that 165 students are now taking Denaakk'e or Menhte Kenaaga' classes at all nine of our river schools. In addition, ten students from Beaver and Stevens Village have joined our video-conference classes. The following language teachers have on-site classes in addition to participating one day a week in the video-conference classes:

"Taamaanyee" Sophie Alexie in Kaltag; "Hok'etnolno" Irene Henry in Allakaket; and Katie Kangas in Ruby.

This quarter students learned about animals, birds, fish, and berries. As students learn the new vocabulary they glue a picture of the animal to their landscape poster. In addition to the animal or bird, students learn to use the word in a sentence. One parent reported that her son saw a raven and said "Dotson' doldo.", which means 'a

raven is sitting up there'. A "solution station" poster was sent home to all students so they can share and practice their language with their parents or grandparents.

This quarter I was able to make visits to Kaltag, Hughes, Koyukuk and Ruby. In Kaltag and Ruby I was able to provide language-teaching strategies to Sophie Alexie and Katie Kangas, respectively. The greatest joy in my job is working with the students face to face, seeing them have fun while learning. In Koyukuk and Ruby I took student portraits.

Each of the guests for the Wednesday Story Hour have been such a treasure. Elders have shared cultural stories to students in Allakaket, Hughes, Huslia, Koyukuk, Nulato, Kaltag, Minto and Manley Hot Springs. Mary Rose Agnes of Kaltag talked about growing up in camp and shared her late father Alexie Pitka's song. Pauline Peter of Nulato advised students to become hard workers. Setsoo Cecelia Beetus talked about paddling for three days before the introduction of kickers. Students sang her Hooleelaanh Dedzaanh Sodeelts'eeyh in honor of her 90th birthday. Eliza Jones and I dissected a white fish using the document camera. Madeline Williams of Hughes dissected a deyh 'spruce grouse' and blew up it's air sac, also known as the crop. One sack was full of el 'spruce needles' and the other was full of blueberries. Billy McCarty of Ruby told a story about when he went out muskrat hunting with his father when he was nine years old. Martha Wright of Ruby told about how they moved from Mouse Point to the Kokrines camp because there was so much grass at Mouse Point, it was fire hazard.



The fall caribou skin is the warmest because the fur is thick. The skin is used as a mattress when out camping. Michael also taught the students about what he carries in his survival gear.

In the middle, Sarah Silas leads along with LouAnn Williams. Chad Roberts, second grade, leans in to intently learn the songs. Chad has been a song leader in his class since he began school.




<u>Scott Brucker</u>-Special Education Teacher, Minto School
