The Alaska EED is encouraging educators to use the following descriptions. Please strive to be consistent in our use of these terms.

Curriculum – What our students should know and be able to do...the entire sum of our lessons and teachings. The end goal of what we want our students to learn.

Instructional Materials – The tools (textbooks, workbooks, computer programs, etc) we use to help us teach the curriculum.

Standards – Content Standards established by the State of Alaska.

New Alaska State Standards

The State of Alaska will put into operation new, more rigorous, Math standards and Language Arts standards beginning in 2015. YKSD is following the EED rec-



ommended process of a three phase implementation spread out over three years. We are currently in the "Awareness" phase of implementation. Earlier in the school year, each teacher was sent a copy of these new standards. Later this Spring, a webinar will be scheduled to give all of us an introduction to the new standards. Career & Technical Education

Lots of different Career & Technical Education activities have been taking place. Five students attended an orientation in Fairbanks for the UAF courses: Professionalism in the Healthcare Workplace, First Aid and CPR, and Introduction to Health Careers. All five students obtained 0.25 high school credits, I UAF credit, and their American Heart Association Heartsaver First Aide Certification for the First Aid and CPR course. The stu-





dents are completing the other courses via distance education. Two middle school students attended a weeklong Robotics Intensive Session in Fort Yukon. The students assembled robots and even designed robotics controlled by computer.

Three students attended Welding I and Welding II Intensive Sessions in Fort Yukon. Welding I focused on small-scale projects, while in Welding II they are cre-

ated large projects. One student attended the Computer Applications/MS Office Intensive Session in Fort Yukon and is building her computer skills.

The upcoming Intensive Sessions in Fort Yukon are HSGQE Academy on March 25-29th, Introduction to Tribal Management on April 25-29th, Alternative Energy Systems on May 3-8th, and Fire Science Academy I on May 3-5th. To attend students submit an application packet, go through a review process, and be selected.

Another upcoming activity is the 'Crossing Our Bridges' Health Academy on April 15-26 in Galena. Students will obtain their Emergency Trauma Technician Certification as well as complete the UAF course Professionalism in the Healthcare Workplace.

Applications packets are being sent out and due back by March 15th. Up to twelve 10th-12th graders may attend this camp.

Advanced Camp Kick Ash will take place March 20th – April 13th in Aniak and Anchorage. After completing three and one-half weeks of intensive work, a written test, and hands-on practical students will obtain their Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certification. A total of four students may attend this session.
