

Meaningful Tribal Consultation with Yukon-Koyukuk School District

Superintendent Boyd

YKSD has eleven tribes who are strong advocates of education and cultural and community perseverance. To capture the desire and wishes of the tribes, YKSD will be working with each of the tribes using a systematic approach. YKSD is currently developing a plan for meaningful consultation that will bring about the top priorities that need to be included in our YKSD schools today.

Tanana Chiefs Conference, the regional non-profit social service agency for the Doyon Region held a summit of Interior Alaska tribal representatives and school districts on January 27-28, 2017 in Fairbanks. The federal act, Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), mandates that school districts consult with tribes on federal grants and educational decisions.

The first meeting between Yukon-Koyukuk School District and the eleven tribes within YKSD met to build a relationship, discuss educational priorities, begin collaborating and to brainstorm ideas on what and how the tribes and school districts can make sure every student succeeds.

As we work through and with the eleven YKSD tribes, district and school personnel, and the YKSD Regional School Board, a solid plan along with policies and procedures will be prepared and implemented to ensure the students are receiving a well rounded, balanced approach to education that includes both traditional and western education. The educational plan will include priorities of local communities in collaboration with teachers, community members and school district leaders. Once the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development finalizes the state plan on tribal consultation, YKSD will share the plan with all YKSD community members. We expect the plan to be finalized and in place by June 2017. Meeting times and locations will be established within the next couple of weeks if you are interested in participating.

PreK Literacy Packs

Pre-Kindergarten Literacy Packs - This semester, we began distributing literacy packs to all of the families with children enrolled in the district's Pre-Kindergarten program. These packs include a new book, materials for an activity to be completed at home, and a bookmark with two suggested activities to support the child's literacy and development. In February, we're working on asking questions as we read and on responding creatively after we read. The packs will be sent home with the PreK students each month through May.

Primary Professional Learning Communities -

In February, the PreK-3rd Grade teachers practiced using the Feedback Protocol they learned during in-service in an online environment. Each teacher posed a question that they have been working through, and then their colleagues responded to that question with positive feedback and helpful suggestions for the teacher to consider as they plan their next steps. It was an exciting opportunity for everyone to explore a new way that the tool could be used.

This year, the YKSD earned its accredited status through AdvancED thanks in large part to the work done by our principals, teachers, and community members. In order to maintain this status, AdvancED requires that the district develop and enact goals, objectives, strategies and activities to address all of the Improvement Priorities identified by the external review team during their visit. Our Improvement Priorities are:

- Develop, implement and monitor a prioritized plan to engage students in their learning through the use of experiential learning strategies.
- 2) Evaluate decisions to see that they are supporting system goals and values, leadership priorities, teaching & learning, and are financially sound.
- Review and evaluate current professional learning program in order to imbed experiential learning strategies, including hands-on and project-based tasks in their performance.

The District Office's Accreditation Committee is in the process of establishing some preliminary goals and action steps that will be shared with the schools and community for input in the coming months. When asked what advice he would give to YKSD students, Tom emphasized the value of learning to work hard and listening to one's parents. He also noted that he would

tell students to be confident, and don't be afraid to try new things. He recalled the values of hard work and confidence that his parents had instilled in him as a child and how that helped him when he joined the National Guard as a young man.

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Teaching and Learning Department

Another important component of reading is fluency, which is the ability to read with feeling at the appropriate rate. Fluent readers "sound good" when they read.



Fluency can only be practiced by the student reading out loud to an already fluent reader who can coach them. Here are a few tips that families can do at home:


*Fluency is best practiced when the student and an older fluent reader take turns reading the same passage. That way the student can hear what it supposed to sound like before taking his or her turn.

*Fluency practice can be as short as one sentence or even one phrase at a time.

*It's impossible to work on fluency and learn new words at the same time...remember, fluency is about how it sounds.

*Fluency practice is a great way to spend a few minutes with your child!

Phonemic Awareness is the very first step to successful reading and is appropriate for preschool students. Research shows that students must understand that words are made of sounds and recognize that sounds combine into words before they can read successfully. Below are twelve building blocks of Phonemic Awareness.

This is an easy to do lesson that promotes Phonemic Awareness by helping preschoolers become aware of how sounds are formed, how our mouths make sounds and how sounds are similar or different.

Phonemic Awareness

A Kinesthetic Awareness of Sound

Discuss the following questions to help the students begin to think about words.

What is a word? Answers will vary.

What are some examples of words?

What makes words different from each other?

Words are made of sounds.

There are 45 sounds that combine together to make English words.

Is 45 a lot of sounds? Answers will vary.

One of those sounds is /p/. Say /p/. /p/

What does your mouth do when you say the sound /p/? My lips are closed and then pop open.

Put your hand in front of your mouth as you say /p/. What do you feel as you say the sound? air popping Can you plug your nose and say /p/? yes

Now say /b/. How is your mouth shaped when you say /b/? My lips are closed and then pop open.

How is it the same as /p/? It is exactly the same. Can you feel air coming out? yes Can you plug your nose and say /b/? yes Why are these sounds different? Answers will vary.

Place your hand on your throat as you say /p/ and /b/. What do you feel? My throat buzzes or vibrates when I say /b/ but not /p/.

By discussing how sounds are formed, students will develop a kinesthetic awareness of sounds. This will provide students with the additional tool of feeling the difference between sounds, not only listening for the difference. This is vital for kinesthetic learners and for students with weak auditory skills.

Now say /p/ and /f/ and feel the air coming out. How are they different? /p/ has a short puff of air and then it stops. For /f/ the air keeps coming out.

Now say /v/. How do you say /v/? I put my top teeth on my bottom lip and blow.

Put your hand in front of your mouth and feel the air as you

Now say /f/ and /v/. How are they the same? My mouth is the same for both of them.

Place your hand on your throat as you say /f/ and /v/.

How are they different? /f/ is unvoiced. /v/ is voiced.

By putting our mouths in different shapes and turning our voice boxes on and off, we can make different sounds. These sounds make up words.





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Denaakkenaage' / Denakenaga' Hunek 'Our Language News'

January was a cold month in Interior Alaska. The language students at Yukon-Koyukuk School District learned the vocabulary and sentences for clothing. In English, the verb "put on" applies to any type of clothing. In Denaakk'e, the verb changes depending on the type of clothing. Students learned the different verbs by playing the game Setsoo Deenee, an adaptation of Simon Says; singing songs, and clothing races.

Students made clothing cards to play board games and a paper doll with traditional clothing. After the clothing unit, they learned about dog racing. They made a miniature dog sled and dog team. Students had to write sentences about their team. The verbs used included ownership, number of dogs, color of dogs, position in the team, and commands. The sixth hour class, grades 5-8, made Google Slides about their dogs.

In preparation of Valentine's Day, elementary students made pop-up cards to give to their friends or family. They practiced their phrases by I) choral response (everyone repeats after me) and 2) a game of rock, paper, scissors. Students sang a song about friendship, Seggenaa' Eslaanh, an adaptation of the Indian Rock n Roll by Louis Demoski by Velma Schafer. In this song, students learned action verbs like "my friend is dancing, my friend is nice, my friend is playing etc." A Musical Valentine Heart game reinforced the verbs by students physically acting out the verbs.

The next unit will be on spring time animals and animal tracks. Student artwork will include making faux stained glass of different animals.

ASTE Presidential Award

YKSD's Luke Meinert, was ASTE's 2017 President, and he awarded Superintendent Kerry Boyd with ASTE's Presidential Award. This is the presentation he shared with ASTE's membership when presenting the award:



Every year the president of ASTE gets to award a Presidential Award to someone that reflects the values and vision ASTE represents. It's my great honor to present this award to the superintendent of one of the largest districts geographically in the state covering 70,000 square miles (roughly the size of the state of Washington). The district purchased 30 additional computers to help support this year's testing cycle.

Microsoft Office 365 - YKSD has rolled out Office 365 for both river & Raven students. Office 365 Education is a collection of services that allows you to collaborate and share your schoolwork. It's available for free to teachers who are currently working at an academic institution and to students

365 - who are currently attending an academic institution. The service includes Office Office Online (Word, Powercollecpoint, Excel, and Oneallows Note), ITB of OneDrive storage, Yammer, and SharePoint sites. The new Statewide Assessment Performance Evaluation for Alaska Schools (PEAKS) from DRC will first be administered this spring 2017. Students will take the English language arts and math assessments in grades 3 through 10, and the science assessments in grades 4, 8, and 10. Students in Allakaket, Hughes, Huslia, Manley, Minto, Rampart, and Ruby will take the test on paper and students in Kaltag, Koyukuk, Nulato, and Raven will take the assessment on computer. Please check with your school for the exact testing dates and help your child be prepared by getting proper sleep before testing.

These end-of-year assessments inform policy makers and the public, including parents, about how well students are meeting Alaska's academic standards; provide data to improve schools and to close achievement gaps; and ensure equity in educational opportunity for all students. School districts will continue to use classroom assessments throughout the school year to monitor student progress and inform instruction.






