



At the beginning of each year it's always a good idea to perform a payroll checkup to make sure you're having the right amount of Federal Withhold Tax deducted from your paychecks. Luckily the IRS has provided a app to walk you through the process. Go to www.irs.gov/W4app and click the 'Use the Tax Withholding Estimator' button.

Even though the process is fairly easy, you will need to gather the following documents together before you begin:

- Your most recent paystubs for yourself, and if your married, for your spouse.
- Information of other sources of income you may have.
- Your most recent income tax return.

It's also a good idea to double check your Federal Withholding Tax deduction anytime you've had a major life change such as buying a home, marriage or new baby.

NEW 2022 Spring Statewide Assessment - There will be a new statewide assessment in the spring of 2022 for Alaska students. The new assessment is called the Alaska System of Academic Readiness or AK STAR for students, grades 3-11. Practice tests and item type samplers will be available for AK STAR in January 2022. The test will be administered in the month of April 2022.

MAP Testing - All students grades K-11 are given benchmark assessment three times a year to make sure they are progressing along academically. The winter window will be January 10-28, 2022. The assessments are outlined below.

Grades K-2: STAR Early Literacy Assessment in reading

Grades K-2: MAP Assessment in Math

Grades 3-11: MAP assessment in Reading, Math and Language Usage

Parents can get a copy of their students' report from their teacher during parent teacher conferences.

Esteem Grant

This grant has 4 components: Culture and Language, Social and Emotional, Credit Recovery and CTE. This is a choice grant meaning, parents are the initiators and have choice of the activities offered to their children. The website for this grant is currently being developed and should be live by January 2022 where parents can make those selections. We are unable to send any contractors to sites unless they are requested. We were able to sign on a couple of contractors who have made a few rounds to our schools. Below are two offerings under the Social and Emotional component.



Plight Club is a youth-centered resilience-building bring together youth and adults from the community to learn important social, emotional, and resiliency skills. Teaches youth how to add caring, connected adults in their lives (Anchors) to create a Web of Support. Youth identify their strengths and work with adults and peers to solve problems while keeping each other safe, focused, respected, and involved. Builds protective factors and important skills for academic, social, emotional, and behavioral success. Decreases youth risk behaviors such as bullying, alcohol & drug use, suicidal ideation, and more.



Johnny Oldman School

The excitement never ends at Johnny Oldman School! We wrapped up October with a Halloween carnival celebration, completed a student fundraiser, had fun dressing up during Spirit week. For November, we have celebrated National Native American Heritage month, completed a Toyostove repair class, enjoyed green eggs and ham during our Dr. Seuss STREAM afternoon, and got ready for Thanksgiving with a gym-time favorite: "Stuff the Turkey"!



In Mrs. Bellamy's elementary classroom, the students have been working hands-on in a variety of ways, exploring math and reading concepts

through real world activities. Recently, the students baked their own bread, reading the recipe instructions, measuring the components required, kneading the dough, and baking it before taking their "yummy" creations home! Other projects included making "ghosts" float using balloons, static electricity and other materials, and also planting and measuring the growth of the plants in our green house.

The elementary students also get the opportunity to practice their ukulele skills every week with Dancing with the Spirit (and will be showing off their skills with "Jingle Bells" later this month).

In the middle school classroom, we finished a two-month long project focused on Fictional storytelling and plot devices. From developing plot (rising action, climax, resolution) to implementing conflict, suspense, and exposition, the students wrote their own 4-to-6-page stories. After a classroom vote, Ethan Bellamy's story was chosen to turn into a short feature film. The students drafted storyboards to plan the film, and then wrote dialog and scenes for the complete script. The final product was an eight-minute short, filmed on-location at the school, utilizing a green screen (check out the picture of Payton falling from a rocket ship!)

Also in the middle school classroom, the students had the opportunity to dissect and inspect owl pellets for rodent bones. Some students found complete skulls in the owl "leftovers", while another student discovered parasites in their sample.

Lastly, our art club has been working diligently on animal face creations. The students splattered and decorated paper using paints and pencils, before cutting these sections out in triangular shapes to create backgrounds. With animal templates, the students then painted on the eyes, nose, and mouth on their works of art!
