# Teaching & Learning Department

#### Literacy and Math Focus

The district will continue our focus on literacy this year in all grade levels and all subjects. Reading with and to your child for 20 minutes a day will help foster the love of reading.

This year, we have added a new instructional goal-focused on Mathematics Mastery. Our goal is that every student will master foundational math skills by sixth grade. We have hired a new Math Specialist, Simon Huff, to help support this goal. Through the MACSS Grant, we will be able to hire a second Math Specialist to help support our teachers and students. For Raven, one of our teachers, Erica Jones, will be assisting as a Computer Technologist to support parents and advisory teachers with math programs. We have also newly hired a Computer Science Specialist, Jakobe Boyd, who will assist both River and Raven teachers with Computer Science and Computer coding classes.



## Math Challenges

Our first semester of math challenges has come to a close, and we had 124 student videos submitted on Flip in addition to 11 student groups who competed in the Gingerbread House Contest, which included completing associated grade level math tasks. Our goal for the spring is to get more sites involved in these fun and challenging activities, as the majority of respondents have come from just two sites. A special shout out to Hughes and Ruby, and thanks to everyone who participated in our Fall challenges!"



## Other Important Updates:

The K-5 Science Committee will meet in February to decide the new Science Curriculum for Elementary School.

The Social Studies Committee will begin meeting in the second semester to review and recommend a new social studies curriculum.

The Winter MAP testing window is January 9 - 27. We are expecting to see great growth from our students!

#### Assessments

#### 2022 AK STAR:

The results from the spring 2022 assessment were made public November 10, 2022. Paper reports were mailed to parents on December 6, 2022.

#### **MAP Testing:**

All students in grades K-II will take NWEA Measures of Academic Progress, MAP, assessments in the fall and winter. The spring benchmark will be combined with the statewide AKSTAR Assessment. For students scoring below the average range in Reading and Math on MAP, teachers will set individual goals for students in Response to Intervention (RTI) plans. School staff will analyze individual student growth reports and RTI plans and School Improvement Plans will be updated accordingly.

#### Star Early Literacy & Star Reading Renaissance:

YKSD Benchmark assessments grades K-12 Each quarter. Grade K-2 (non-readers) will take Star Early Literacy. Grades 2-12 and K-2 readers will take Star Reading. Report are available as the student finishes his/her test.

#### LEP Testing:

Students, whose Parent Language Questionnaire provides information regarding a language other than English spoken in the home, may be designated as "Limited English Proficient" (LEP). The district uses the WIDA ACCESS test (annually) and W-APT placement test for these students. Identified students will be tested **February I – March 3 I**.

#### Alternate Assessment:

Students with severe cognitive disabilities will take the Alternate Assessment in place of the annual State of Alaska test. Special Education staff will be trained to administer the assessment to students who qualify per their IEP.

#### Covid Screening:

Districtwide COVID testing has ended due to the state grant ending and a significant decrease in demand. Free at-home COVID tests for students and staff will be available at school front offices while supplies last.

Recognizing a fake ad, or website. We've all seen ads and likely clicked on one or two. But is the redirect really safe? Number one is always trust your instincts. Malicious Adware can place viruses directly onto your computer or take you to a fake website. Cyber criminals tend to use spoof websites. Always check you are where you want to be before entering personal information. Eebay.com, faceboook.com, youtuube.com are examples of spoofed websites. A better method is right clicking an ad and copying the URL. 

# **Heating Safety Tips**

It may not come as a surprise that heating equipment is the leading cause of residential fires in Alaska. While I am certain everyone is anxious for warmer weather, I am afraid we are going to have to keep the heaters on for a while longer. If you use a wood stove in your home, check out the following safety tips from the Rural Fire Association of River Walls Wisconsin.

- Don't place the stove in an area of high traffic.
- Keep anything that can catch fire at least 36" from the stove.
- Don't dry clothing over the stove- clothes that can fall and ignite.
- Install your stove in accordance with local regulations and those suggested by the manufacturer.
- Ensure proper ventilation in the house.
- Avoid placing ashes near combustible materials before you are certain all burning embers are out.
- Inspect and clean the stove, chimney connector, and chimney at least once a year.
- Check twice monthly for creosote buildup in your chimney connector and chimney.
- Never use or store flammable liquids, especially gasoline, in the vicinity of the stove.
- Burn only seasoned wood. Green wood burns inefficiently and causes a buildup of creosote.
- Be aware of the dangers of CO poisoning, which can occur due to incomplete combustion in your wood stove, furnace, or appliances. CO detectors are available in stores.

Electric heaters account for a surprisingly large share of home heating fires. According to the National Fire Protection Association, between 2011 and 2015 portable and stationary space heaters were responsible for 43% of home heating fires and 85% of home heating fire deaths. If you use space heaters, make sure to check out the following graphic for safety tips from the Electrical Safety Foundation International.




