A big Thank You to our outgoing board members, **Dian Gurtler, Manley and Fred Bifelt, Huslia.** They have both served as advocates of students on the YKSD School Board for over 20 years each. Their dedication and support will carry on for years to come.

Tanana City School District will be officially joining YKSD next school year. It has been a long process, including passing legislation to make this happen. Maudrey J. Sommer School will be included as an additional school with the Yukon Koyukuk School District effective July 2024.

As the request of YKSD to the Alaska Division of Elections, a question was placed on the ballot to add two additional school board seats for Yukon Koyukuk School District. As a result, the communities voted to expand the school board from a seven-member school board to a nine-member school board. The additional seats are expected to be added in time for the October 2024 School Board Elections. The Alaska Boundary Commission will work with the Alaska Department of Education and the District to determine where the two seats will be added.

Several brand-new vans were ordered for the students to help offset travel expenses when they arrive in Fairbanks for student activities. The 12 passenger vans will be dedicated to the schools for transporting students.



School Construction Projects

The Rampart School Construction project will begin spring of 2024. The district received a grant for just under 10 million dollars to renovate the school.

Minto School Construction project is well underway with the expected completion date of October 2024.

The District Career Technical Education Building is on target to be completed by October of 2024. Once completed, the district will have a brand-new facility with a 26-bed dorm for short stays. The building is located in Fairbanks near the Home Depot.


Our Math Specialists, Chuck Backe, and Simon Huff, through the Math and Computer Science for Students (MACSS) Grant, have traveled to all of our sites to help support our teachers and students with math instruction, math centers and hands-on cultural math activities. They will schedule a second round of visits to each site for the Spring semester. 

Heating Safety Tips

It may not come as a surprise that heating equipment is the leading cause of residential fires in Alaska. While I am certain everyone is anxious for warmer weather, I am afraid we are going to have to keep the heaters on for a while longer. If you use a wood stove in your home, check out the following safety tips from the Rural Fire Association of River Walls Wisconsin.

- ♦ Don't place the stove in an area of high traffic.
- Keep anything that can catch fire at least 36" from the stove.
- Don't dry clothing over the stove- clothes that can fall and ignite.
- ♦ Install your stove in accordance with local regulations and those suggested by the manufacturer.
- Ensure proper ventilation in the house.
- Avoid placing ashes near combustible materials before you are certain all burning embers are out.
- Inspect and clean the stove, chimney connector, and chimney at least once a year.
- Check twice monthly for creosote buildup in your chimney connector and chimney.
- Never use or store flammable liquids, especially gasoline, in the vicinity of the stove.
- Burn only seasoned wood. Green wood burns inefficiently and causes a buildup of creosote.
- ♦ Be aware of the dangers of CO poisoning, which can occur due to incomplete combustion in your wood stove, furnace, or appliances. CO detectors are available in stores.

Electric heaters account for a surprisingly large share of home heating fires. According to the National Fire Protection Association, between 2011 and 2015 portable and stationary space heaters were responsible for 43% of home heating fires and 85% of home heating fire deaths. If you use space heaters, make sure to check out the following graphic for safety tips from the Electrical Safety Foundation International.





It's Time for a Federal Withholding Check-up!

At the beginning of each year it's always a good idea to perform a Federal Withholding Tax checkup to make sure you're having the right amount of tax deducted from your paychecks. Luckily the IRS has provided a app to walk you through the process. Go to www.irs.gov/W4app and click the 'Use the Tax Withholding Estimator' button.

Even though the process is fairly easy, you will need to gather the following documents together before you begin:

- Your most recent paystubs for yourself, and if your married, for your spouse.
- Information of other sources of income you may have.
- ♦ Your most recent income tax return.

It's also a good idea to double check your Federal Withholding Tax deduction anytime you've had a major life change such as buying a home, marriage or new baby.






Counselor's Corner

Language Classes

Denaakk'e Classes: Language classes this quarter consist of four Upper, five Central – KR, three Central – YR, & four Lower dialect classes. We have a combination of both Early Elementary, Upper Elementary, and a few Secondary classes. The Secondary classes that joined this year have been doing great. It's been nice having a variety of age groups and grade levels in Native Language this year. I'm hoping to see more secondary classes join in the future!

Classwork Update: After finishing Units 9 – Leek Eent'aanee'? (Do You Have a Dog?) and Unit 10 – Saanh Ggaagge Hodee? (Where Is the Summer Bird?). We moved into the beginning of the workbook and have completed Unit 1 – Nedaats'e Ne'ooze'? (What's Your Name?) & had recently started Unit 2 – Do'eent'aa? (How Are You?). To end the semester, we've been practicing Denaakk'e Christmas Songs with Tristan Madros the new YKSD Cultural teacher who has been signing on during our class times.

Shoutout: Onsite Native Language co-teachers have been doing an amazing job this semester! Their engagement with the students and investment in the Language not only sets an example for the students, it means a lot to the people in the communities, and to me.

Cultural Activities

Catherine Attla, who was videoed in one of the episodes played a major role in the documentation of our Kk'edonts'ednee Stories & Traditional Beliefs in her books As My Grandfather Told It, and guided the author who wrote Make Prayers to the Raven.

Students are encouraged to draw as they're listening during Story Hour & to verbally share their thoughts when Story Hour has ended.



CTE - Career Explorers

The Career Explorers component of YKSD's CTE program continues to move forward. This program, serving grades 6-12, aligns with YKSD's goal to have students explore career opportunities and have a career plan and portfolio by the time of graduation.

One component of the Career Explorers program is for a career counselor to visit each YKSD community at least once this year. To this aim, Jeff Walters has visited five sites (Kaltag, Nulato, Rampart, Hughes, and Huslia) in fall semester and plans to visit the remaining five sites (Ruby, Allakaket, Tanana, Minto, and Koyukuk) in spring. During these visits, Jeff conveys information to students about current YKSD CTE activities, post-graduation opportunities, and related AKCIS (Alaska Career Information System) lessons. He also assists students with resume and cover letter preparations.

A second component of Career Explorers involves monthly delivery of AKCIS lessons to all middle school and high school students via distance delivery. This is carried out by Melissa Good, a counselor who graduated from high school in Galena.

Also LifeSkills lessons are being provided to students. Through this course students will learn the essential skills, personal qualities and values that enable students to thrive in the workplace. Furthermore, this course will help prepare students to be successful members of society. Students will learn basic skills such as: self-discovery, family basics, finances, career planning, computer skills, time management, etiquette and much more through learning opportunities in the classroom and the community. In addition, students will develop practical living skills such as being healthy, cooking, and cleaning. Students will be introduced to skills to successfully manage their personal finances. As students will need skills to successfully navigate the world of work, students will be introduced to communication skills, scheduling, conflict resolution, dressing for success, and appropriate use of technology.

In addition to these site visits and lessons—and in conjunction with the University of Alaska Fairbanks—Career Explorers planned two "Camps" this year, one in Nulato in November and one in Tanana in April. These week-long camps provide select 11th and 12th graders with an opportunity to explore career options in more detail, as well as prepare professional resumes and cover letters and practice job interview skills. Students who participate may earn one UAF credit as well as a stipend from Tanana Chiefs Conference. Unfortunately, weather was not our friend as we attempted to travel to Nulato November 13-17. Four students from other villages (two from Rampart, one from Hughes, and one from Allakaket) plus instructors and chaperones made two attempts in two days to travel to Nulato but, because of dense ground fog, could only make it as far as Galena before turning around and heading back to Fairbanks. Augh! In the end, everyone defaulted to Plan B and the camp was held in Fairbanks. Fate continued to conspire against us as we tried to link the class to Nulato but were unable to make the link work. In the end, only the four above-mentioned students were able to participate—but they did GREAT work with their UAF instructors and all successfully completed the college-level class.

The spring semester Career Explorers camp is planned for Tanana April 15-19. Juniors and seniors, including those from Nulato who were unable to participate in November, may apply. In addition, Jeff is planning to revisit Nulato in early April with the hope of working one-on-one with graduating seniors to help finalize post-graduation plans and preparations.

Career Explorers is also planning an in-depth, individualized capstone program in Fairbanks for select graduating seniors April 29-May 3.

Career Explorers is excited for the work we're doing to help students explore CTE options in YKSD as well as post-graduation opportunities!







Wednesday, October 18th, we held our fall stream night. Stream nights to promote literature are great community events and include a community dinner in addition to the family activities.


